

HEADMASTER'S PERSPECTIVE 2008

2008 has been a fantastic year in the life of Whangarei Boys' High School - from the outstanding Education Review Office report early in Term 2 to the consolidation of initiatives begun in 2007 e.g. Prefects giving book reviews in Assemblies, Word of the Week, Blokes can read posters, Black Jackets Senior Choir, Carruth Full Hostel choir, Talent Quests etc) - the list goes on and on. The school has had a wonderful year and the progress that we have made in a number of areas - particularly with Maori achievement has been pronounced. Our academic successes were acknowledged at the beginning of the year, as we always do, with our academic assembly and a large number of boys were awarded Academic Colours. We also acknowledged our 8 Scholarships and these boys were certainly deserving of their success. We have had our fathers involved, as we always do in two key areas this year - Dads'n'lads Car Rally and a new initiative set up by Assistant Principal Peter Ludlow a Dads'n'lads Fishing Weekend with fishing guru Bill Hohepa. The Hostel has continued to grow and we have built on the property development in the Hostel with finely killing off the old coal boiler and replacing it with gas! No more cold showers! He is highly organised and has the curriculum and assessment responsibilities in the school. His ability to work with all staff and to have the respect of all the boys is testament to his professionalism and to his passion for educating young men. He has done a fantastic job as Deputy Principal and the school certainly have valued his input during his 13 years at this school. Geoff's

He can take huge pride in all of the work that he has done in the school - not only as a Technology maestro and Graphics master, but also the way the school looks is in no small measure due to his passion for detail and his ability to think outside the square and solve a number of problems with minimal cost. It is fitting that he retires from teaching to move into Architects H & K (where he has been working this year while on leave). The relationship the school has

Moascar Cup Reunion



At the annual dinner this year we took the opportunity to have a reunion of the surviving members of the Moascar Cup winning 1st XV from 1953.

Often referred to as the 'Ranfurly Shield' of secondary school rugby, the Moascar Cup has been played for by thousands of college boys since it started its chequered career in 1920. To many youths the chances of playing for the Moascar Cup represents potentially the biggest rugby occasion of their playing careers.

The Cup is unique. It was won by the New Zealand Mounted Rifle Brigade in Egypt shortly after the end of World War I. The brigade was stationed at a base camp at Ismailia with 10 Divisions made up of six British, three Australian and the one New Zealand Division. All were waiting repatriation to their own countries and sport was encouraged to fill in the time to keep everyone occupied. So a rugby tournament was initiated and a trophy for the winner was designed, the Moascar Cup. As you can see from the picture it is a magnificent trophy with the base being made up of the thick central part of a propeller of a German plane brought down in Palestine and a silver cup with four handles on top. A very striking design.

The Moascar Cup was first won by the IVth Mounted Rifle Brigade of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force at Moascar in the Middle East. Hence the name with 'Moascar' being Arabic for 'camp'. At the end of WWI the trophy was made available to the NZ Rugby Union and, in an attempt to foster college rugby, they put the Cup up for competition amongst secondary schools in New Zealand.

The Cup went from Christchurch to Auckland Grammar to New Plymouth to Te Aute and finally ended up with Palmerston North Boys' High in 1927. There it remained for over two decades and was competed for in annual matches against Te Aute College. In 1951 Northland College challenged Te Aute and brought the Cup to the North. The following year Kaitaia College challenged and won the Cup and in 1953 Whangarei Boys' High finally had their day in the sun when they challenged for and won the Cup with a 3-0 victory over Kaitaia.

The Cup stayed with Whangarei Boys' High School for two years,

defending it against Kaitaia once and Northland

College twice before it was again lost to Kaitaia in 1955. They held it for two more years before losing it to Northland

College in 1957 who held it until 1962 when it was won by

Pukekohe High School. Northland College had another tenure from 1965 to 1970 when it was won by Wesley College and the Cup has not been back in the north since.

It was with pleasure that we were able to formally recognise the surviving members of that winning Whangarei Boys' High School 1st XV with 10 of them attending the dinner and another 3 unable to make it on the night. Regretfully 6 members of that team are no longer with us.

We are very pleased that we were able to update the 1st XV photo from 1953. Let us hope we can honour other significant Whangarei Boys' High School teams at future functions.

OBITUARY


It is with regret and sadness that the WBHS Old Boys' Association has had to record the passing of a number of its Old Boys during 2008 and some also who we had not noted previously. We would like to extend our condolences and sympathies to all those who have lost loved ones during the year but would like to make mention of two in particular.

Lt Col Douglas George Morrison (1904-2008)

One of Whangarei Boys' High School's most prominent Old Boys, Lt Col Doug Morrison, who passed away during October at the grand age of 104. Doug has been a stellar supporter of the School in recent years and was always on hand at the School's ANZAC Service, as he was this year, to read the ode. He attended Whangarei Boys' High School from 1917-18 and only left due to the School being closed because of the influenza epidemic that was around at the time. Apparently the boys were in town celebrating the declaration of peace at the end of WWI and the

> School was shut while they were away. He never returned

and stayed to work on the family farm. His presence around Whangarei and the School will be missed and I know that all Old Boys and current School extend sincere condolences to Joan and the family.





Frederick Philpott (1918-2008)

We also wish to acknowledge the passing of Fred Philpott (WBHS 1930-35) who passed away in September. Fred was the Junior Steeplechase Champion in 1931 and he very kindly donated the bronze medallion he was awarded for this to the School Archives some time ago. Our condolences and sympathies are extended to Fred's family and friends.

THE FIDELITER FELLOWSHIP

The Association, in conjunction with the School, was very pleased to this year introduce our own version of a hall of fame, The Fideliter Fellowship. Through this we will be able to celebrate Old Boys who have been successful in business, the professions, the arts, medicine, politics, the military and of course in the sporting arena. Each year a selected few will be inducted into The Fideliter Fellowship with suitable notation of their achievements. Their photo and citation will be displayed in the Assembly Hall.

While in future years it is anticipated that inductees will be nominated by Old Boys and the general public, with the final selection being by the Fideliter Fellowship steering committee. this year the inductees were chosen by the WBHS Old Boys' Association Committee. The full criteria and nomination process is on the School website www.wbhs.school.nz under the Old Boys tab. Anybody can nominate somebody as long as the nomination is at least seconded by an Old Boy.

So if you are aware of somebody you may like to nominate please complete the forms and send them into Greg Weaver who will check them for accuracy and completeness before passing them to the steering committee for consideration. And to ensure you have enough time to do so the close-off for nominations this year will be extended to January 31st 2009.

The first of the inductees this year were inducted at the School's ANZAC Service on 18th April and these were Lloyd Trigg VC. DFC. and Derek Ward DFC & Bar. A further three were inducted at this year's annual dinner and they were all sportsmen - Peter Sloane and the late Joe Morgan for rugby and Dave Sirl for athletics. A summary of each induction is below.



WBHS 1927 to 1932 Orchestra 1929, Rugby 1st XV 1931, Colours 1931 KIA in Atlantic 11 August 1943 after sinking a submarine with his aircraft fully ablaze. Awarded Victoria Cross



DEREK WARD DFC. & BAR WBHS 1932 to 1936 Head Boy 1936, Rugby 1st XV '35 & '36, Colours '35 & '36 KIA in North Africa 17 June 1942 while protecting two of his men from German fighters. Awarded Distinguished Flying Cross on two occasions for his skill and bravery.



JOE MORGAN WBHS 1959 to 1963 Senior Gymnastics Champion 1962, Rowing Team '63, Rugby 1st XV '62 & '63, Colours '62 & '63 Played a record 167 games for Northland and also 22 games including 5 tests for the All Blacks. Scored one of the great tries for All Blacks. One of Northland's favourite sons tragically killed in 2002.



PETER SLOANE WBHS 1963 to 1965 Rugby 1st XV '65, Cricket 1st XI '65, Colours '65 Played 147 games for Northland and captain for 6 years. Played 6 games including 1 test for the All Blacks. One of New Zealand rugby's most respected coaches and a great ambassador for Northland and New Zealand.



DAVID SIRL WBHS 1957 to 1961 Prefect '61, Rugby 1st XV '60 & '61, Colours '60 & '61 World renowned athlete. Competed at international level for 30 years. Set world record in 1987 that stayed for 20 years. Part of winning NZ World Cross Country team in 1975. Inducted into NZ Sports Hall of Fame.

CYCLE TRACK

This was the occasion of the formal opening of the new gas heating system that had been installed at Carruth House, a system that was only possible due to the generosity of our Old Boys. All former Carruthians would know that up until then water heating in the hostel had been by way of a coal fired boiler. Most Carruthians will remember with angst the task of having to shovel the coal each day. So it was with pleasure that Old Boys and former Carruthians Rob Dickie and Richard Papworth took part in the ribbon cutting ceremony with Richard helping a couple of current Carruthians shovel the last of the coal.

THE JOE MORGAN MEMORIAL BOARDERS' LOUNGE

The Association is currently focussed on raising close to \$400,000 for the Joe Morgan Memorial Boarders' Lounge, the new recreation lounge to be developed at Carruth House. At the present time there is still a further \$230,000 to raise thanks in no small way to a grant of \$50,000 received from the Oxford Trust here in Whangarei. It is pertinent to take this opportunity to publicly acknowledge the Oxford Trust and thank them, not just for the amount but also because they could see that this project has merit for the community.


And a huge thank you to all Old Boys who have thus far made a donation towards this project. Carruthians have been bombarded with literature over the past 6 months and many have responded positively. The Association will continue to follow up with other Carruthians over time.

Something that is being incorporated into the new lounge is a Commemoration Wall. This will be made up of bricks on which we will record all names of those who have made a donation towards the project. The bricks will be in four colours with a dollar range for each colour as follows – bronze \$100-\$499, silver \$500-\$999, gold \$1000-\$4999 and platinum for all donations or pledges of \$5000 or over. So if you would like your name to be recorded for prosperity it is simply case of completing a pledge form, designating the Joe Morgan Memorial Boarders' Lounge and sending in the form with your payment if making an immediate gift.

SCHOOL PRANKS

A couple of weeks back at the School the customary end of year pranks started to get in full swing when a bunch of young ladies from the Girls' School streaked in their underwear through the Quad at lunchtime causing some thing of a furore amongst the testosterone laden young men who were there at the time. This streak was in response to the 'full monty' streak a couple of eager lads performed across the field at the Girls' School the previous day. (The identification parade for the boys must have been an interesting spectacle)

Anyway it came to mind of putting together a dossier on some of the pranks that Old Boys have been involved in or witnessed at the School and we hope that you might put pen to paper (or finger to keyboard) and drop a line into Greg Weaver of the details of the prank and the punishment that followed. Just to whet your appetite here is a snippet from the Centennial book about 'The Exploding Loo' from Jim Goodison, a student at the School 1933-36.

Everyone who was at Whangarei Boys' High School during the era of the late Mr W A (Bill) Given has memories of that awesome yet lovable figure. In 1936 'Old Bill' had some sodium that had become dangerous and he had to dispose of it. Selecting a 'reliable' boy from the 6th, one Gordon Leigh, he instructed him to proceed down to the Waiarohia Stream and toss it in.

Young Leigh was a keen science student but perhaps not so keen on walking any distance so he decided on a short-cut by flushing it down one of the toilets in the Quad. Remembering the experiment to produce hydrogen gas by dropping sodium in water, he placed a small piece in the pan and added a touch of toilet paper which, causing friction, ignited the gas producing the typical blue flame. Grasping the nettle, as it were, he then emptied the whole bottle into the toilet, pulled the chain and ran. The resultant explosion rocked the whole school.

Masters, Scholars and the Caretaker, Milotn West, hurriedly rushed to the scene.

And there the matter lay until an hour later when Gordon reappeared and owned up. It was generally agreed that 'Old Bill' was more annoyed at diagnosing sewer gas than Gordon blowing up the loo.

Do you remember the famous Sports Day when, in the excitement, almost the whole of the two Schools surged onto the sports track? Next day the Boys' School was paraded on the bottom field and all those who transgressed were asked to step forward. Adopting the old adage that there's safety in numbers, everyone stepped forward. Undaunted, Humphrey Dyer, who had not long returned from the war where he had been Commander of the Maori Battalion, rolled up his sleeves. He formed a queue which stretched from the totara tree almost to the stone wall. It was a case of two each on the backside and the last in the queue assured us that Humphrey's swing was, if anything, improving with each shot. He was a tough, fit soldier but he did confess long after that the last twenty or so were tough going.

AERIAL PHOTO

One of the wonderful photos that is held in the Archives is an aerial photo of Whangarei taken in 1956. It measures 1300mmx800mm and is an original 'hand-coloured' copy from the days when aerial shots were all black and white and were coloured by a painter. There are at least two others in Whangarei, both a little larger and in better condition, and they hang in the foyer at the WDC offices in Rust Ave and one also in the Public Library. However the one held by the School was unique in that it had the School in foreground and looked out over Whangarei from the north-west. Unfortunately the photo had fallen into disrepair and was in need of restoration. Enquiries through the Northland Museum indicate that to restore this photo to its former glory would not be possible and they suggested that the best thing to do would be re-take the photo and have it digitally restored.



As it turned out Old Boy Neal 'Rubber' Martin (WBHS 1980-84) was able to help out with the skills to do the job and he is currently in the throes of restoring the photo. At the Old Boys' Sports Day this year a number of Old Boys saw the original photo and when it was indicated that Neal was going to restore it, several suggested they would like a copy of the restored version. So we thought that before we finalise everything we might offer other Old Boys the opportunity to purchase a copy of the photo. An impression of the photo is on this page but being in black and white probably does not do the photo justice. In any event if they so wish Old Boys can purchase either an A1 or A2 sized copy for \$70 and \$40 respectively plus postage and packaging. While this is not a fundraising promotion, Neal has said that he will donate 20% of any purchases to the Association.

FUNDRAISING

This year has seen a change in the way fundraising for major projects is administered at the School. In the past this has been through the School managing the donations made by Old Boys but this year has seen a shift with the WBHS Old Boys' Association taking over this role. Any donations for this project can be directed to Greg Weaver at the School.

Why might you want to make a donation? Of course the major reason we would hope is that you would like to do your part to help out your old school, albeit through the Association. Or you would just like to recognise in some small way the start that your school gave to you in your early years. And if that memory happens to not feature too fondly for you, perhaps your donation will help to ensure that the boys of today will enjoy their time at the School.

Or maybe it is so that you can take advantage of the relaxed tax rules that apply from 2008 where the limitations that existed for rebates have been lifted. Where previously there was a ceiling on the amount that could attract a rebate, this ceiling no longer exists and the total amount of your donation, up to your total annual net income, is eligible for a rebate. So that is another factor that you can take into consideration when thinking about making a donation.

In any event please be assured that any donation is most graciously accepted and will be allocated as per your instructions.

And if you are not in a position to make a donation at this time but may be able to in the future, if you indicate your intention to do so through a pledge we can follow up with you at a later date.

The big thing to remember is that the WBHS Old Boys' Association is an Incorporated Society with 7,000 validated members. Which means if we all pitch in with a little we will go a long way towards reaching our targets.

For example start a regular automatic payment each week, fortnight or month as one Old Boy has just done recently for \$10 a week for the next three years. Now this may not sound a lot by some people's standards but imagine if 1,000 Old Boys donated \$10 a week for 3 years. Then we are talking significant figures.

Whangarei Boys' High School has a long tradition of producing fine young men and the WBHS Old Boys' Association wants to help keep that tradition alive. With the help of you, our Old Boys, we can.

If you have ever thought about giving a gift towards the fundraising campaign

you can do so either :

By a one-off payment in cash, by cheque or credit card.

Or by a pledged payment to be made at a later date or to be spread over a period of time (sort of a buy now pay later plan). This means that you do not have to have the funds now but can budget it for a time when you might have. It is still important though that we are told of your intention to do so as these are funds that can be worked into any project budget.

There are also other options available that we are happy to discuss with you. Or you may have your own ideas on how we build our fundraising funds.


If you are unable to make a direct donation, there are still other ways that you can help the cause.

There is an initiative that is being introduced at Carruth House. It is called 'The Carruth Experience'. Basically it is an invitation to Old Boys to come and enjoy dinner at Carruth. If any one so chooses they can also stay the night in a dorm to fully experience the old days in Carruth and enjoy breakfast the next morning. Either way this is an opportunity to relive past memories or maybe rid yourself of some past demons. The dates chosen for this in 2009 are March 14th and August 22nd. Purchase a Snowballing Fuel Card. Basically when you purchase petrol through a Caltex outlet you pay for the gas with the card. Once a month you will receive a statement with your fuel costs for that month. The beauty of it is that the card allows for rebates at the pump of 1.5 cents per litre. This rebate is calculated monthly based on your usage and can be donated towards our fundraising, or you may choose to keep it yourself, or you may choose to split it between the two. Either way petrol is something that the majority of us use and, apart from the fee for the card, there are no other costs, just your normal fuel consumption. A great way to control your fuel costs as you will see how much you are using each month while also supporting the Association's fundraising. Old Boy Ian McDonald (1963-66) and his wife operate a charity jewellery franchise in the USA. He has offered to make a special lapel pin for Old Boys with an added twist – half the cost of the pin will go towards the Association's fundraising. To give you a brief description of the pin it is made from .925 grade sterling silver and will measure about 20mm by 17mm, so it is good quality product. A photo of the pin is at left here (Front & Back). The cost would be \$70, although I am sure we could negotiate that with fundraising taking a lesser cut. However we cannot commit to producing these until we get an indication from Old Boys as to whether they might like to purchase one of these. So all you need to do if you might like to purchase one is to get in touch with Greg Weaver. Once we have received all feedback we can decide on whether an order can be placed.

Join BuzzthePeople. BuzzThePeople is an online research panel of New Zealanders who pay charities when people complete surveys. If you have already signed up thank you very much. If you have not yet signed up please do so. Buzz will donate a minimum of \$1 to Whangarei Boys' High School for every research survey you do. And these are on average two a month. So again the more people we have registered the more money is raised.


ANZAC Day Service

Nieces and nephews of Derek Ward

Francis Charles Baker attended Whangarei Boys' High School, or Whangarei High School a sit was in those days, for one year in 1911 before he took up a position with the Post Office in 1912. So why would we mention him in a WBHS Old Boys' Association newsletter?

Each year at the ANZAC Service Prefects read out the School's Roll of Honour. The first name read out is F C Baker. He was killed in France during WWI. He was 21 years old.

One of the School's long serving teachers, Alan McGunnigle, who retired last year, took a trip with his wife to explore Europe and on the way visited many of the battle sites and cemeteries in Belgium and France. At one particular cemetery at Polygon Wood Alan came across the headstone belonging to Rifleman F C Baker and immediately recognised the name.

As Alan's wife Beryl said in a recent article in the Advocate, 'His name is read out in Whangarei every year and there he lay in that peaceful little piece of farmland. He really had no connection with us and yet he did'. This must have been one of the most solemn moments Alan had experienced while also being able to celebrate the life of one of Whangarei Boys' High School's own

Eric used to live next door to Jack Glanville's house in Manse Street and was on hand when the house was being cleaned out after Jack had passed away. He noticed this medallion and picked it up and held onto it all these years. What was interesting about this medallion is that it was awarded to Donald Scott for winning the Junior Athletics Championship in 1944 but Donald never received it as he left the School before prize-giving. Obviously Jack Glanville tucked it away for safe-keeping and there it remained.

After a few phone calls it was discovered that Donald had passed away in the 1980s, after a career in optometry, and it was only through the endeavours of a couple of people in Hikurangi that we were able to make contact with Donald's nephew who collected the medallion on behalf of the family.

Performing Arts

A couple of the major achievements this year included:

Mercury Bay Big Sing: Four students travelled to Whitianga to participate in the Mercury Bay Big Sing. This was a four day event, comprising 8 hours of rehearsals each day culminating in an evening concert on Saturday. It was a fabulous experience and the students gained many skills which they are continuing to develop. The WBHS boys were admired not only for their singing but also for the way they conducted themselves while at the seminar so were a credit to the School and to the Association. The final concert featured a solo by WBHS student Rangi Hall with the others being an integral part of the chorus.



Jonathon Croucher, a Year 9 student, was selected to be a member of the New Zealand Secondary School Symphony Orchestra. Jonathon was one of eight cellists to be selected from secondary school students throughout New Zealand from Invercargill to Whangarei. Students attended a five day course in Christchurch which culminated in a public performance on Saturday 26th April. It is quite an achievement to be chosen for this orchestra as a Year 9 student.

Sports

There have been a lot of great performances by our sports teams and individuals this year but there is one achievement that over-shadows all the rest.

It has all been said before but now we can really shout from the rooftops - Whangarei Boys' High School has the best secondary school clay target shooting team in the country. There may not be room in this newsletter to mention all their exploits but we shall give it a go.

- At the Hamilton Boys' High School Shoot in July there were 250 shooters competing from all over the North Island. In the team event WBHS No. 2 team finished 1st with the No. 1 team finishing 2nd, albeit after a shoot off with Hamilton Boys' High School.
- In the North Island Championships that followed the next day the WBHS No.1 team reversed the previous days result by finishing 1st and in the process shooting 297/300 which equalled the National School Record of only 3 points dropped. The No. 2 team finished 2nd after a shoot off with Waiuku College.
- At the National Championships the Whangarei Boys' High School Shooting Team proved that they are the NUMBER ONE Secondary School team in the country by defending the SPL/Winchester Inter-schools Challenge Trophy they won for the first time last year and were also crowned the New Zealand Secondary

School's Clay Target Points Score Teams Event Champions for the 2nd year running. Making this result even more incredible was that the WBHS Number 2 team came third. To defend the trophy they won last year is no mean feat.

To cap it all off the team won the Team of the Year at the ASB Secondary Sports awards, an honour that some say they should have also won last year. And one of the members of the team, Ethan Erceg, was named the overall Northland Sportsman of the Year. The same categories were also won at the School's annual prize-giving.

These boys continue to do the School proud week after week and they are virtually unbeatable in Northland Secondary School competitions and are taking that form into national competitions. The number two team consisted of: Ian King, Hugh McKenzie, Hayden Coote, Rhys Were and Josh Wilson.

Specifically coaches Chris Erceg and Mike Newson and Manager Annette Erceg but also all parents of the boys involved. They must be thanked for the many hours they put in in training, transporting, fund raising and the like. Such a wonderful team effort.
